# Message from our YCC Coordinator



2025 was a highly productive year for the San Juan Islands Youth Conservation Corps. Over the course of our 8-week season, we strengthened existing partnerships, forged exciting new ones, explored new project sites, and—true to form—got our hands good and dirty as we worked to protect and restore the natural beauty of these islands.

We are grateful for the collaboration and support of our community. From partners in the field to family members cheering from home, every person who contributed to this season helped make it a success. This was not without its challenges—weather, remote logistics, and the complexity of new projects tested us—but our crews met every obstacle with determination, adaptability, and heart.

This year saw the continuation of important work begun in 2024, including gorse removal in Olga in collaboration with the San Juan County Noxious Weed Board and native seed collection on Yellow Island with The Nature Conservancy. We also expanded our impact with several new projects: installing beaver dam analogs with the San Juan County Land Bank, preserving cultural heritage through maintenance on the historic Patos Island Lighthouse, and conducting tree ring analysis on Turtleback Mountain for the San Juan Preservation Trust.

We are proud of our 38 crew members, whose commitment, hard work, and growth as conservation leaders will benefit the ecosystems of the San Juan Islands for years to come. Their efforts reflect the power of youth engagement in stewardship and the importance of continued investment in conservation education.







# YCC Winter/Spring Programming



YCC has expanded its programming to provide San Juan Islands youth with year-round opportunities to experience the benefits of YCC. Explore some of the exciting programs we now offer throughout the year below.







## LOPEZ

YCC is continuing its collaboration with the Lopez Island Family Resource Center to offer after-school opportunities for middle school students. Participants engage in handson stewardship projects at various sites across Lopez Island. Program sessions are held on Tuesdays from 2:00 PM to 5:00 PM.

## SAN JUAN

On two weekend days each month from January through March, San Juan Island youth can participate in conservation projects in partnership with Wolf Hollow, BLM, and San Juan County. Participants will earn a \$25 stipend for each day of service while contributing to stewardship efforts across the island.

## ORCAS

The Orcas Island School District partners with YCC to bring environmental stewardship into the classroom through Mr. Carter's Outdoor Adventure class. Students take part in hands-on restoration projects at parks and preserves across Orcas Island, with each class completing 2-3 projects per semester.
